## The New Gillies Website is Live!

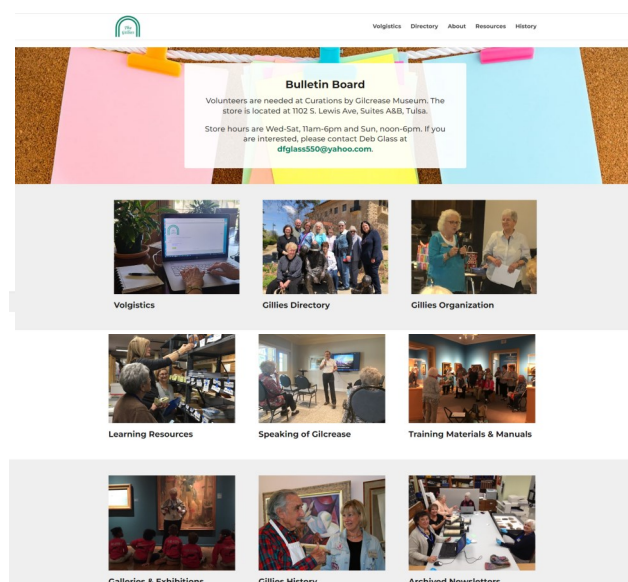
The Gillies website had a professional makeover this summer. The new secure website is <https://thegillies.org>. If you bookmarked the old website on your phone or on your computer, you need to replace it with this new one. When you go to this website, you will enter the new password – **gillies2022**.



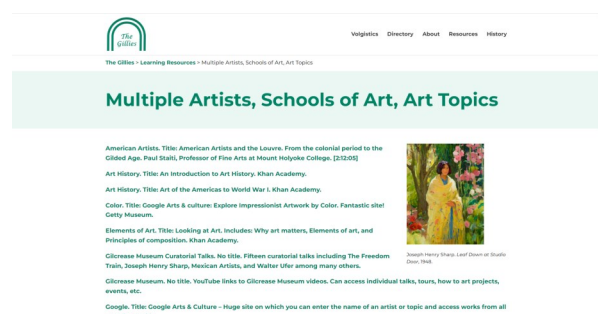
The Home Page appears giving you access to all of the sections of the website. First, you will see two green “buttons” to click for the current Friday Footprints Newsletter and for the Calendar for 2022-2023. Then, as you scroll down the page, there is a Bulletin Board for announcements such as volunteer opportunities and upcoming Gillies trips and events.

Continue down the Home Page and you will find photographs with nine sections of the website – Volgistics, Gillies Directory, Gillies Organization, Learning Resources, Speaking of Gilcrease, Training Materials and Manuals, Galleries and Exhibitions, Gillies History, and Archived Newsletters. Clicking on the photographs or the titles will take you directly to the pages for the various sections.

The Gillies Directory page, for example, has contact information for all members in alphabetical order as well as instructions for searching. The Gillies Organization page has links to documents about the officers and governing policies, the minutes of meetings, and job descriptions.



The Learning Resources page lists topics that provide you with many links to websites and videos about various artists, schools of art, historical features, and much more. The Training Materials and Manuals page has links to the Gillies Manual and the Docent Manual. The pages for the other sections operate in a similar manner. Simply click on any text in bold green and it will take you to a document, a website, or a video.



This new website is intended to provide Gillies with the resources to support our organization’s mission and activities now and in the future. 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## Gillies attend National Docent Symposium

Docents from more than 100 museums in the U.S. and Canada (plus one from Australia) attended the National Docent Symposium in Kansas City on September 16-19. Delegates from the Gillies included Kathe Crapster, Becky Hatchett, Nannette Tresner, Alana Trisler, and Deanna Storm, who attended as a member of the NDS Council. The docent delegates heard a keynote address by Jane Chu, past chairperson of the National Endowment for the Humanities, who was born in Shawnee. She spoke about the past, present, and future of museum practice.



Over two days the delegates had an opportunity to attend four breakout sessions, led by docents from various museums who spoke on a variety of topics, from attracting and training docents to reaching and engaging all visitors, both in person and virtually. Our four Gillie docents each attended four different

breakout sessions, so in all, they heard 16 different presentations. They will be sharing what they learned with each other and with you in future docent meetings. In addition, they had the opportunity to tour the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art, the host of the conference, and two of them took a tour of the contemporary Native American art at the Nerman Museum in Overland Park, Kansas. The delegates all agree that they enjoyed seeing great art and learning new ways to engage our visitors and members, but one of the best things about the conference was meeting docents from a variety of museums, small to large, with docent corps of a few to hundreds, who all share the same mission. They even got to talk with a group from the Princeton University Museum who are also waiting for a new museum to be completed before getting to work again.

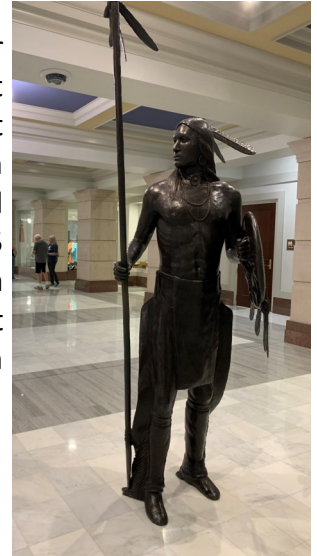
### Tour the Oklahoma Capitol & Governor's Mansion

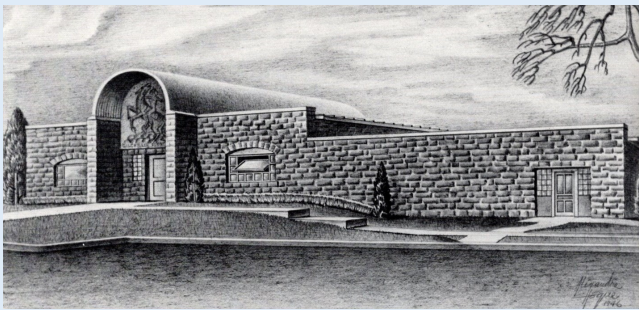
